How to Prepare the Manuscript Files

Definition:

Research Articles are also called "Original Articles" and are considered the common types of articles. The content of the paper must justify its length.

Abstract:

A structured abstract is required, including these headings:

- Background
- Objectives
- Methods
- Results
- Conclusions

Full Text:

For the original research, traditional sections are required, including:

- Background
- Objectives (optional)
- Methods
- Results
- Discussion
- Conclusion
- References
- Acknowledgments
- Funding/Support
- Conflict of Interests
- Authors' contributions

In the full text of an original article, the maximum number of:

- References are: 55
- Illustrations or tables are 5

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Short Communications are suitable for the presentation of research that extends previously published research, including the reporting of additional controls and confirmatory results in other settings, as well as negative results, small-scale clinical studies, clinical audits and case series. Authors must clearly acknowledge any work upon which they are building, both published and unpublished and should include: Title page; the Abstract; Background and Aim; Materials and Methods; Results; Discussion; Conclusions; Acknowledgement; Funding/Support, Conflict of Interest and References.

- 1. **Title page:** The complete title of the manuscript, the name of all the authors with their highest qualifications, the department or institution to which they are attached, address for correspondence with telephone numbers, e-mail, and Fax number.
- Abstract: All original articles must accompany a structured abstract up to 250-300 words. It should be structured as Background and Aims, Materials and Methods, Results and Conclusions followed by 3 to 5 Keywords. Keywords will assist indexers in cross indexing the article as they are published with abstract. Use terms from the Medical Subject

Headings (MeSH) list of index medicus (http://www.nlm.nih.gov/mesh/MBrowser.html). Authors need to be careful that the abstract reflects the content of the article accurately.

- 3. **Introduction:** (650 Word) this should summarize the purpose and the rationale for the study. It should neither review the subject extensively nor should it have data or conclusions of the study.
- 4. **Materials and Methods:** This should include exact method or observation or experiment. If an apparatus is used, its manufacturer's name and address should be given in parenthesis. If the method is established, give reference but if the method is new, give enough information so that another author is able to perform it. If a drug is used, its generic name, dose and route of administration must be given. For patients, age, sex with mean age \pm standard deviation must be given. Statistical method must be mentioned and specify any general computer program used. The Info system used should be clearly mentioned.
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- 6. **Discussion:** should emphasize the new and important aspects of the study and the conclusions that follow them. Possible mechanisms or explanations for these findings should be explored. The limitations of the study and the implications of the findings for future research or clinical practice should be explored.
- 7. **Conclusion:** This should emphasize the present findings and the variations or similarities with other work done in the field by other workers. The detailed data should not be repeated in the discussion again. Emphasize the new and important aspects of the study and the conclusions that follow from them. It must be mentioned whether the hypothesis mentioned in the article is true, false or no conclusions can be derived.

8. Ethical Considerations

Compliance with ethical guidelines

Ethics code and its issuing reference should be mentioned.

Please add: "This research received no external funding" or "This research was funded by NAME OF FUNDER, grant number XXX.

Authors' contributions

Designate each author's contribution using their initials.

For example: "Conceptualization, X.X. and Y.Y.; methodology, X.X.; software, X.X.; validation, X.X., Y.Y. and Z.Z.; formal analysis, X.X.; investigation, X.X.; resources, X.X.; data curation, X.X.; writing—original draft preparation, X.X.; writing—review and editing, X.X.; visualization, X.X.; supervision, X.X.; project administration, X.X.; funding acquisition, Y.Y".

9. **Tables:** In limited numbers should be submitted with the **captions placed above**. Do not submit tables as photograph. Place explanatory matters in footnotes, not in the heading.

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The style of a table should be simple. Each cell must contain only one paragraph or one line. Do not use the Space or Enter keys to align content across the table or to create a new line, indent, or justify the content.
